- Approve an ordinance for Pin High Properties LLC and Shepherd Capital LLC's allowing a conditional use permit for a senior group home/shared housing establishment facility at 6809 Barnard Mill Road.

NIGEAC ELECTRIC AGGREGATION PROGRAM SELECTS NEW SUPPLIER FOR THE NEXT PROGRAM BEGINNING THIS SUMMER

McHenry County, IL (April, 2015 – Officials of the Northern Illinois Governmental Electric Aggregation Consortium (NIGEAC), are pleased to report that they have completed negotiations and selected Constellation New Energy ("Constellation") as the group's electric supplier for the next term. NIGEAC communities include Algonquin, Genoa, Huntley, Lakewood, Ringwood and Woodstock. Constellation will begin supplying the group with electricity flowing in July 2015 (August billing). Residents and small businesses in the current program have collectively saved approximately \$8 million in the first 2 ½ years of the program.

The NIGEAC recently completed an exhaustive bidding process and chose Constellation to serve the Program at a fixed rate of 6.89 cents/kWh for a 2-year term. Constellation will replace the program's current supplier, Direct Energy. Chalen Daigle, Official Coordinator for the group said, "We are pleased to have negotiated a rate that's lower than the current rate." Daigle added, "Our offer with Constellation also includes an option to be supplied by 100% renewable energy resources."

Current participants and newly eligible residents and small businesses should expect to see Opt-Out letters from Constellation on or around April 25. The letters will arrive in clearly marked envelopes mentioning the Aggregation Program on the outside and will include the respective community logo. Newly eligible customers are those who receive their generation supply from ComEd, or in other words, those who have not chosen a supplier on their own. Be on the lookout for your letter and please read it carefully, it will explain the rate and terms and conditions. If you wish to remain in the program or be added to it, simply do nothing. If you do not want to participate, follow the instructions for opting-out within the 21-day period.

A similar letter will be sent to residents in the six communities who are not eligible for automatic aggregation. These residents will be allowed to receive the same low rate, terms and conditions but will need to contact Constellation to enroll. Once again, all of this will be explained in the letters expected to arrive on or around April 25.

The NIGEAC and individual community leaders stress that residents need to wait for those letters to arrive. Do not contact Constellation as they will not be ready to accept enrollments until after the letters are mailed. Likewise, please do not contact your community officials as they are not staffed to handle large volumes of calls. The letters you receive from Constellation will provide all the information you need to make an informed decision and will include a list of Frequently Asked Questions.

Under Illinois law, communities are able to form aggregated buying groups to purchase electricity on behalf of their citizens. The governmental aggregator chooses an alternate supplier for all of the members in its group. Customers may opt out of the aggregation program and shop for a supplier or accept the standard rate offered by ComEd. ComEd will continue to deliver the electricity, read meters, send monthly billing statements and maintain service for residents and small businesses.



Update - MTFPD to perform training exercises and then burn down abandoned farm houses.

As you know, on May 2, 2015 the McHenry Township Fire Protection District (MTFPD) performed training exercises and then burned down the abandoned farm house located on the east side of Ringwood Road (next to Modine). On May 29, 2015, the MTFPD plans to perform training exercises and burn down the other abandoned farm house located on the west side of Ringwood Road near the intersection of Ringwood Road and McCullom Lake Road. This farm house's location will be the future site of a new McHenry Township Fire station and Ringwood's future Public Works site.





Your Village Officials are pleased to inform you that on April 23rd the Plan Commission and Village Board unanimously approved the 2015 Village of Ringwood Downtown Plan and voted to incorporate the plan into the Village of Ringwood's 2006 Comprehensive Plan. As you know, the Ringwood Village Board and Planning/Zoning Board of Appeals had Committee of the Whole meetings throughout the months of January and February to discuss and develop Ringwood's first downtown plan. In addition, on March 31st your Village Officials hosted an open house to receive feedback on our downtown plan from Ringwood Residents. The overall goal of this plan is to create a short and long term plan that will provide direction for future development and improvements in downtown Ringwood and the surrounding area. Below you will find goals of this plan:

- Create a unified vision for the downtown and associated opportunities and improvements such as gateways, streetscape, landscape, rehabilitations, new buildings, etc.
- Provide strategic recommendations and standards for the preservation, development, and redevelopment of compatible uses which complement the existing character.
- Identify key opportunities for future business, residential and civic/public uses.
- Develop a pedestrian friendly environment that will address existing needs, enhance linkages to/from the downtown (i.e. Prairie Path Bike Trail to Glacial Park and surrounding region).
- Accommodate future improvements and focus on a pedestrian friendly downtown area.
- Provide a well-defined implementation strategy.
- Identify funding sources and phasing methods.

These project goals can and will be accomplished while remaining mindful of the unique existing characteristics of Ringwood. Without a plan for our downtown, others will define what Ringwood will be in the years to come.

In Governor Rauner's February 18th Budget Address to the Illinois General Assembly the Governor proposed to cut the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF) by 50%. LGDF is a state fund into which a portion of state income tax revenue is deposited annually. Cities, village and counties currently receive 8% of total state tax revenue through this fund. A 50% reduction in LGDF would cost the Village of Ringwood \$41,382 annually. McHenry County municipalities and county would see a nearly \$14 million dollar loss in LGDF revenue (See attached loss of revenue chart on page 2).



Since 1969, Illinois municipalities have partnered with the state to fund core municipal services such as police, public works, parks and infrastructure projects. A steep reduction in the LGDF will hit these very core services the hardest. In addition to funding core everyday services to Illinois citizens, LGDF distribution plays a role in keeping the local tax burden low. Without LGDF, communities across Illinois would need to explore increases to local taxes. This includes property taxes. Small non-home rule communities like Ringwood with limited revenue options would be hit particularly hard.

Finally, I know that we will all have to make sacrifices to fix Illinois' budget mess. To that end, I am working with McHenry County Council of Governments, the Illinois Municipal League, our Legislatures and the Governors office to minimize the cut to the LGDF and to determine a solution that would help both the state of Illinois, yet not severely impact local governments like Ringwood.
